The well being of our Senior Citizens remains one of Labour's primary concerns, and work has now started on the site for an elderly persons home in Lower Street.

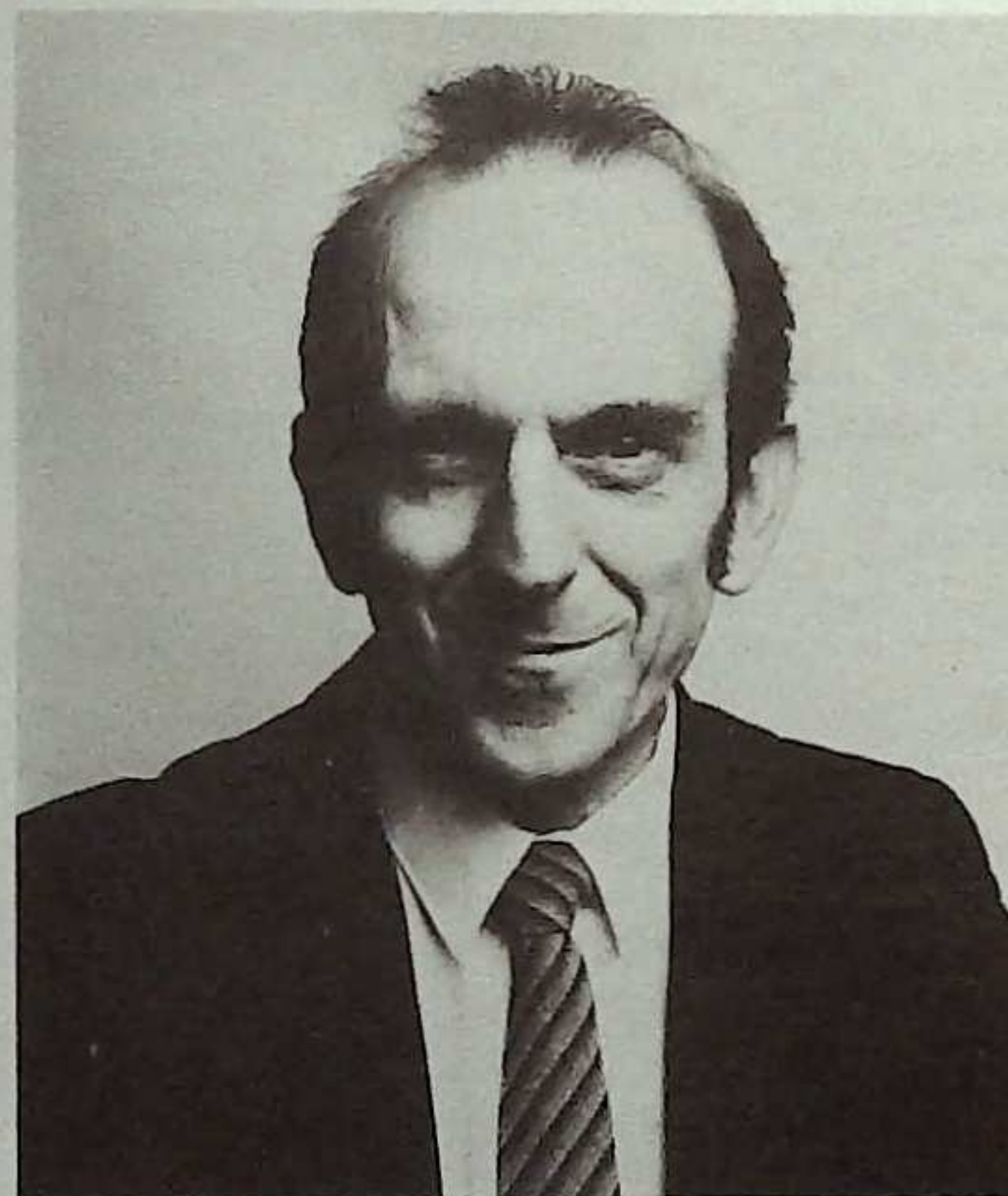
There is a great need for improved leisure facilities and support is being given to those efforts being made to acquire a swimming pool for the town.
